
Pre-reading Strategies: Prepare Students for Reading

Pre-reading strategies are learning approaches designed to give students structure and support before exploring a new text.

- Build Background Knowledge
- Making Predictions
- Setting a Purpose for Reading
- Vocabulary Development





Before Reading: Activate Background Knowledge

Teachers: Share objects or experiences with your students to help make connections to the concept of the book the students will be reading. Below are some suggested activities:

- ❖ Realia
- ❖ A short video
- Music or specific song
- Pictures
- Mystery Bag with objects connected to the topic.









Before Reading: Make Predictions: Anticipation Guides

Teachers: An Anticipation/Reaction Guide can be used to create true/false or agree/disagree questions. Students will predict and answer questions before and after reading. Let students explain their answers and discuss how some responses may have changed from before to after.

(Title of Lesson/Text/Media)

Mark whether or not you agree or disagree with each statement on the <u>left</u> side of the page. At the end of the lesson, go back and decide whether you still agree or disagree on the <u>right</u> side of the page.

Before Reading: Make Predictions: Snowball Fight


Teachers: Ask students to respond to a question or provide an answer or background knowledge on a topic and to write their response on a piece of paper. Then, each student crumbles up their paper and throws it up in the air. Other classmates find it and either read the ideas or answer the question. This can be done as a before, during, or after-reading strategy.






Before Reading: Making Predictions: Organizers

Teachers: Ask students to preview a book and make predictions by using text features such as headings, subheadings, pictures and captions.







Before Reading: Making Predictions: Concept Attainment

Teachers: The Concept Attainment strategy engages students to form their own definition of a concept by examining the characteristics of several examples and nonexamples of the word, concept, or topic. This can be done with picture cards, words, and objects.





Before Reading: Making Predictions: Setting a Purpose

Teachers: Ask students to work independently or in pairs to preview a book to prepare for reading and set their purpose for reading.





Before Reading: Vocabulary Development: 4 Squares


Teachers: Choose words from the text to prepare students as they encounter instructional vocabulary and unfamiliar words.

Before Reading: Vocabulary Development: Roll a Word

Teachers: Ask students to work with a partner. A student will roll the dice and complete the action associated with the number they rolled. The questions can be adjusted and modified to suit the students' needs.






Before Reading: Vocabulary Development: Create Foldables and Vocabulary Cards

Teachers: Create cards with words, pictures, definitions, and sentences. Use the cards on a word wall or for personal dictionaries.







Before Reading: Vocabulary Development: Pictionary

Teachers: Divide students into teams. Students will take turns in their teams drawing illustrations that represent their vocabulary word, while the remaining team members guess the correct word.
